Keep a look out during your monitoring this season to see if your *Avicennia marina* are in fruit (see above). I've noticed some propagules ready for release but not very many and in some places I haven't found any. I'd be interested to know if there are any on the trees at your site. Also just a reminder to keep an eye out for albino propagules (they will be yellow or red).

A big welcome to the new volunteers at the Lota site, we had a great training day recently and learnt to appreciate the unique challenges that come with a low canopy. I will be running a refresher training day for the Ormiston crew at the end of July, if you are part of another crew and would like to come along for a refresher, just let me know.

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Volunteer Profile Maureen Tottenham



'for some reason I always end up the dirtiest on the team'

I've always been a busy person. Growing up on the southside of Brisbane, I was always into sports - netball, tennis, indoor cricket to name just a few. Actually I was a pretty good goal shooter back then and represented Queensland in the Queensland Catholic Netball team. I now live in the eastside of Brisbane and have been there for 19 years.

Over the years I've been involved in lots of community volunteer work and fundraising. Although helping out following the 1974 floods was a memorable time, my best experience as a volunteer would have to be Expo 88 where I worked in the China Pavilion for 504 hours. These days I'm involved in many groups, all associated with environmental protection. I think we all need to take a personal interest in and responsibility for the environment to ensure that we appreciate what we have and leave a better place for future generations.

For the past seven years, I've been Treasurer for the Wildlife Preservation Society Queensland- Bayside Branch (WPSQ BB). We work to raise awareness in all sections of the community, particularly the young, on the principles of conservation and preservation of the natural environment. I'm a Resource Coordinator for Qantaslink. I really do enjoy my job; I've been with them for the last 20 years. At work I try to incorporate my beliefs about recycling and protection of the environment. As a member of the Qantas Green Team I've been able to set up recycling for office paper, toner and printer cartridges, bubble wrap, mobile phones, cd's/dvd's and aluminium cans. I'd like everyone to become more aware of helping the environment because if we don't start to look after the place that we live in, future generations won't know about the wildlife and beautiful places we take for granted. People call me the "Recycle Queen". If you want something recycled just bring it to me and I will find a source that needs it. This might be the local Bayside Branch of the WPSQ or an orphanage in Kenya. Even things like linen - blankets, sheets, and towels can be distributed to local Wildlife Carers or the RSPCA for injured animals.

Joining MangroveWatch

In 2009 Mangrove Watch was launched on the WPSQBB Sea Week Cruise of Moreton Bay. I volunteered to be part of the monitoring program to help keep track of the health of the mangroves in Moreton Bay. I really enjoy the survey and I'm now part of the Cleveland and Coochiemudlo Island crews along with other members of the WPSQ Bayside Branch. Some people don't realise how important mangroves are.

MangroveWatch Surveys

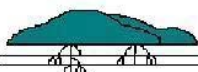
