Next Meeting Friday 25 February 2011 starting at 7.30pm at Redlands IndigiSapes Centre

Our speaker will be Darryl Jones from the Environmental Futures Centre, Griffith University. Darryl has titled his presentation “What can Australia learn from Europe about mitigating road impacts”.

Recently Darryl travel through parts of Europe to discover why things are so different there in terms of attention to the impacts of roads on biodiversity. He was astounded at the scale at which fauna crossing structures are included in all roads, at the attention paid to the possibility of impacts on very small sites, and the general 'maturity' of the field. He met road engineers in France & Hungary who were passionate about how 'their' roads had solved a major connectivity challenge. He returned to Australia convinced that there is much we can learn from this situation. Obviously there are many differences between Europe & Australia but the fundamental problems of roads and fragmentation are global - and the key approaches applicable anywhere.

Join us & find out about this and work done locally giving hopeful signs for our wildlife.

A welcome back to all our readers after such volatile weather over the last few months, although the Redlands was not too impacted, I am sure we all have friends or family that have been affected in some way. Our wildlife has also seen major inundation of their habitats but their resilience to the excesses of our climate should ensure that it reinvigorates stronger than ever.

The repercussions of bad planning will be with us for years to come and there should now be a change in attitude to the idea of a 1% annual chance of flood.

Conservation groups have been lobbying for years against the draining of wetlands and construction on these flooding plains that would normally absorb and mitigate these events. These areas should be reclaimed from the planners and councils and protected. The consequences of

draining, diverting, concreting our waterways can be seen by the concentrated, destructive volumes of water our remaining rivers are now expected to carry. This unfiltered, unfettered water is now impacting on Moreton Bay, one can just imagine the effect this may be having on the marine environment.

Due to uncertainty with weather patterns and the destruction of infrastructure in the Brisbane River we have postponed our annual cruise until June, there is a substituted excursion to Coochiemudlo.



The once popular African Tulip (*Spathodea campanulata*) besides being an invasive weed tree is now proven to be deadly to native bees who attempt to pollinate its flowers.

More on Weeds

Milkweed (*Euphorbia heterophylla*)

This weed is an erect annual herb up to 1.5 m high. Milky sap oozes from damaged stems and leaves. Leaves are ovate to rhomboid, 0.5 - 5 cm wide, paler towards the base with margins entire or slightly toothed.

Leafy bracts around the flower heads are totally green though leaves around flower clusters are paler green at base. (A similar plant, Painted spurge, *Euphorbia cyanthophora*, presents with pinkish red upper-most leaves.)

Flower heads have a characteristic cyathium form, similar to a Poinsettia. Fruits are 3-lobed and when the pods ripen, spread the seeds by explosive release.

Ranked as 182th in the Invasive Naturalised Plants in Southeast Queensland-Queensland Herbarium, the plant has a moderate invasive score of 3.4 (max 5).

Recorded as being toxic to stock.

World Wetlands Day 2011

World Wetlands Day was celebrated by Bayside Branch with two events. Firstly a forum was held on Saturday 5 February and then a bird walk and a mudflat spotlight were held on Sunday 6 February.

The forum was held at Redlands IndigiScapes Centre. An invitation having been issued to all sectors of the community to attend this event and hear some excellent reports about the on-ground community projects being lead by researchers and volunteers to protect South-east Queensland's (SEQ) marine & coastal wildlife habitats.

Also included was an update of how our diverse Moreton Bay habitats are faring the flooding in the Brisbane River. In addition, to the three keynote presentations and update, an inter-active display about the coral-watch and seagrass-watch programs were featured.

The Speakers included naturalist Rod Bloss of the Brisbane and Gold Coast Branches of the Birds Observers and Conservation Australia who spoke about birds of prey in particular in the Logan wetland reserves.

Co-Author of the excellent publication Coral Reefs and Climate Change, Dr Diane Kleine introduced us the coral-watch program which is new to Moreton Bay in 2011 and established in more than dozen countries.

Co-Founder of the Moreton Bay seagrass-watch and mangrove-watch programs, Simon Baltais of Wildlife Queensland profiled the exceptional work by the myriad of volunteers along coastal SEQ.

Weather


The weather we have experienced in eastern Australia in recent months has been both devastating and heart breaking.

It is great therefore to be able to report that there is actually some good news.


It has been reported in the Courier Mail that the loggerhead turtles nesting at Mon Repos near Bundaberg have had their best season in 32 years.

Apparently more that 430 of these endangered animals came ashore to lay eggs this season and more are expected.

Let's hope that the predicted cyclones this season don't whip up the seas and cause erosion that could affect the hatching.
