

Next Meeting Friday 27 May 2011 starting at 7.30pm at Redlands IndigiScapes Centre

Guest speaker at our meeting in May will be Norm Duke who is a mangrove ecologist, specialising in mangroves, climate change, vegetation mapping, pollution and coastal habitat condition assessment. Norm's prior experience was at James Cook University, the Australian Institute of Marine Science, and Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute in Panama. Currently leads an active research and teaching group on marine tidal wetlands at the University of Queensland.

Norm researches and advises on effective management and mitigation of disturbed and damaged ecosystems. He has published 170 plus articles and technical reports, including his authoritative book, 'Australia's mangroves'. He leads the UQ Mangrove Hub, a scientific support group for Mangrove Watch, delivering an exciting community-supported initiative for effective monitoring of healthy mangroves and saltmarsh in tidal wetlands (www.mangrovetwatch.org.au).

Norm is a great speaker and has successfully engaged many communities to become involved in marine science research projects, who now successfully contribute to our knowledge on the health of our coastal systems.

PRESIDENTS REPORT

The last 12 months has passed very quickly for most of us culminating in the ferocious weather early this year that caused such damage and loss of life. From all reports our wildlife has also suffered but is resilient and should recover, but there are grave concerns for Cassowary habitat after the cyclone damage. Our annual cruise had to be cancelled but it will be back next year.

As usual we have had a host of quality speakers on such varied subjects as floating turtles, yellow footed antechinus and birds of Logan. Simon launched a new project a survey of Redland and Brisbane creeks to discover if we still had Ornate Rainbow fish. To our delight some were found despite the presence of exotics and the degradation of our waterways.

Many thanks to those volunteers who turned out to the surveys often in difficult conditions, they were also in force for Mangrove watch which continues to provide important data on the health of the Bay. We

were happy to report that our survey site at Cleveland avoided any major disturbance by floodwaters and pollution that surged from the various catchments. Seagrass watch continues to monitor habitat for our marine life, funding the project is difficult as economic conditions deteriorate. We are grateful for funds received from various bodies that aid our surveys and hope they continue for many years.

We have seen some good news with Stradbroke Island being given the protection status it deserves, even though it will take many years. Plus:

- Simon Baltais "Redland City Citizen of the year 2011"
- The Wenlock River has been protected as a wild river
- Locally efforts continue to protect Koala Habitat

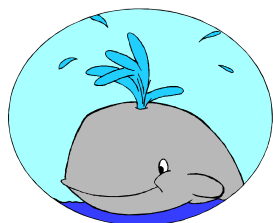
World Environment Day Dinner

Kinross Road Draft Structure Plan

The state government expanded the area of the Kinross Road Structure Plan area & that required Redland City Council to prepare a new plan which has now released for public comment. Details of the plan were published in a brochure distributed recently or can be viewed at RCC offices or on the RCC website www.redland.qld.gov.au. Bayside Secretary, Simon Baltais has prepared submissions on behalf of the branch but more are needed.

Closing date for comments is 22 July 2011.

When submitting your comments please consider

- The plan will fragment riparian habitat, reducing the size of current patches and therefore significantly threaten the biodiversity in this area.
- The proposed transport corridor across the greenspace along Wellington Ponds will pollute this waterway.
- The proposed roads would represent a significant threat to the local native bird populations.
- This plan places an urban environment into a rural landscape that has in the past given koalas a safe environment to move across. Urbanising this area will increase the likelihood of koalas being severely impacted by vehicles and dogs and in the long term disease.

This was a diverse and fascinating group of people who covered topics such as Platypus, Glossy Black Cockatoos, Marine habitat enhancement, Snakes, Musselbrook National Park, Local Wildlife and Dolphins.

We have continued to produce our monthly newsletter as well as a number of educational leaflets.

Our activities included a trip to Boondall Wetlands, displays at shopping centres and participation in projects with other groups including the nestbox program and Adopt a Wetland. A huge effort went into World Environment Day which included a colour competition, wildlife sessions for children and a slide night. There was a variety of scenery and wildlife to be observed and although it was overcast it proved to be quite a good day for this activity.




